

Tovorafenib (Ojemda)

About This Medicine

TOVORAFENIB (TOE voe RAF en ib) treats brain cancer. It works by blocking a protein that causes cancer cells to grow and multiply. This helps to slow or stop the spread of cancer cells. It is given orally (by mouth).

This medicine may be used for other purposes; ask your care team if you have questions.

Possible Side Effects

- Nausea and vomiting (throwing up)
- Constipation (not able to move bowels)
- Tiredness
- Fever
- Abnormal bleeding symptoms may be coughing up blood, throwing up blood (may look like coffee grounds), red or black tarry bowel movements, abnormally heavy menstrual flow, nosebleeds, or any other unusual bleeding.
- Headache
- Infection
- Upper respiratory tract infection
- Rash and/or a pimple like rash
- Dry skin
- Changes in your hair color and/or texture

Note: Each of the side effects above was reported in 30% or greater of people treated with tovorafenib. All possible side effects are not included. Your side effects may be different depending on your cancer diagnosis, condition, or if you are receiving other medicines in combination. Please discuss any concerns or questions with your care team.

Warnings and Precautions

- Severe abnormal bleeding that can be life-threatening
- Risk of skin reactions- this medicine may cause non a pimple like rash, and/ or sensitivity to sunlight/light. You may get a skin rash/reaction if you are in the sun or are exposed to sun lamps and tanning beds.



· Changes in your liver function

Note: Some of the side effects above are very rare. If you have concerns and/or questions, please discuss them with your care team.

How to Take Your Medicine

- **Tablets**: Swallow the medicine whole with water. You can take it with or without food. Do not chew, cut, or crush it. Do not remove tablets from the blister pack until you are ready to take.
- **Suspension**: Follow the instructions on the package insert on how to prepare, measure, and take the medicine. Take the medicine within 15 minutes of preparing it. You may need to prepare 2 bottles of the medicine for a full dose.
- **Missed dose**: If you miss a dose by less than 3 days, take the missed dose right away and go back to your normal schedule. If you miss a dose by more than 3 days, then skip the missed dose and go back to your normal schedule.
- If you vomit a dose right after you take it, repeat the dose. Call your care team if you're not sure if you should repeat or take a missed dose.
- **Overdosage**: If you think you have taken too much of this medicine contact a poison control center or emergency room at once.
- **Handling**: Wash your hands with soap and water, before and after handling your medicine. Your caretakers should not handle your medicine with bare hands and should wear latex gloves.
- This medicine may be present in the urine, stool and other body fluids such as blood, vomit, semen, and vaginal fluids. Take precautions to prevent others from coming in contact with your medicine or your body fluids. Follow safety precautions during your treatment and for as long as directed by your care team after your treatment. If you take a pill each day, follow these precautions every day.
- **Storage:** Tablets: Store this medicine in the original container at room temperature. Keep out of the reach of children and pets.
- **Suspension**: Store the bottle at room temperature. Throw away your bottle(s), including any unused or expired medicine and the syringe after taking a dose. Keep out of the reach of children and pets.
- **Disposal of unused medicine**: Do not flush any expired and/or unused medicine down the toilet or drain unless you are specifically instructed to do so on the medicine label. Some facilities have take-back programs and/or other options. If you do not have a take-back program in your area, then please discuss with your care team how to dispose of unused medicine.

Treating Side Effects

- Drink enough fluids to keep your urine pale yellow.
- If you throw up, you should drink more fluids so that you do not become dehydrated (lack of water in the body from losing too much fluid).
- To help with nausea and vomiting, eat small, frequent meals instead of three large meals a day. Choose foods and drinks that are at room temperature.
- Ask your care team about medicines that are available to help stop or lessen nausea and/ or constipation.



- If you are not able to move your bowels, check with your care team before you use enemas, laxatives, or suppositories.
- Manage tiredness by pacing your activities for the day.
- Be sure to include periods of rest between energy-draining activities.
- To decrease the risk of infection, wash your hands regularly.
- Avoid close contact with people who have a cold, the flu, or other infections.
- Take your temperature as your care team tells you, and whenever you feel like you may have a fever.
- Keeping your pain under control is important to your well-being. Please tell your care team if you
 are experiencing pain.
- If you get a rash do not put anything on it unless your care team says you may. Keep the area around the rash clean and dry. Ask your care team for medicine if your rash bothers you.
- To help with dry skin, moisturize your skin several times a day.
- Avoid sun exposure and apply sunscreen routinely when outdoors.
- Use sunscreen with SPF 30 or higher when you are outdoors even for a short time. Cover up when you are out in the sun. Wear wide-brimmed hats, long-sleeved shirts, and pants. Keep your neck, chest, and back covered. Wear dark sunglasses when in the sun or bright lights.

Food and Medicine Interactions

- There are no known interactions of tovorafenib with food.
- Check with your care team about all other prescription medicines and over-the-counter medicines
 and dietary supplements (vitamins, minerals, herbs, and others) you are taking before starting this
 medicine as there are known medicine interactions with tovorafenib. Also, check with your care
 team before starting any new prescription or over-the-counter medicines, or dietary supplements to
 make sure that there are no interactions.
- This medicine interacts with hormonal birth control (i.e., birth control pills, skin patches, vaginal rings, injections) and affect how they work. Discuss with your care team what method of birth control may be right for you during your treatment.

When to Call Your Care Team

Call your care team if you have any of these symptoms and/or any new or unusual symptoms:

- Fever of 100.4° F (38° C) or higher
- Chills
- Develop sensitivity to sunlight/light
- · Headache that does not go away
- · Tiredness that interferes with your daily activities
- · Wheezing and/or trouble breathing
- Coughing up yellow, green, or bloody mucus
- Nausea that stops you from eating or drinking and/or is not relieved by prescribed medicines
- Throwing up more than 3 times a day



- No bowel movement in 3 days or when you feel uncomfortable
- Signs of abnormal bleeding such as coughing up blood, throwing up blood (may look like coffee grounds), easy bleeding or bruising, red or black tarry bowel movements, abnormally heavy menstrual flow, nosebleeds, or any other unusual bleeding
- Signs of possible liver problems: dark urine, pale bowel movements, pain in your abdomen, feeling very tired and weak, unusual itching, or yellowing of the eyes or skin
- New rash and/or itching or a rash that is not relieved by prescribed medicines
- · Dry skin that is bothersome
- Signs of infection: fever or chills, cough, trouble breathing, severe pain in your abdomen, trouble urinating, burning or pain when you pass urine, redness and/or swelling of the skin

Reproduction Warnings

- Pregnancy warning: This medicine can cause serious birth defects. If you can become pregnant,
 use nonhormonal birth control while taking this medicine and for 28 days after the last dose. If you
 can get your partner pregnant, use non-hormonal birth control while taking this medicine and for 2
 weeks after the last dose. Tell your care team right away if you think you might be pregnant or think
 your partner might be pregnant.
- Birth control pills (oral contraceptives) and other hormonal forms of birth control may not be effective with this medicine.
- **Breastfeeding warning**: Do not breastfeed while taking this medicine and for 2 weeks after the last dose.
- **Fertility warning**: This medicine may affect your ability to have children in the future. If you plan to have children, talk with your care team.
