ORTHOPAEDIC SURGERY CLINICAL ROTATION INFORMATION

DESCRIPTION

Students will scrub and assist with a combination of elective procedure and trauma cases while on rotation. In addition, they will help with consults/procedures in the emergency department. Students work with Orthopaedic Surgery attendings and residents, integrating into the care team. Students will receive complete, hands-on experience, starting with seeing and evaluating patients in the emergency department and translating that information into a succinct presentation/plan and history and physical. They will then be able to put their plan to practice in the OR with the attendings and senior residents. Students will then help round on their patients, help with day-to-day care, and write progress notes. In the outpatient setting, students will work 1-on-1 with attendings seeing new patients and developing treatment plans. Finally, students will be able to experience outpatient surgery at our ambulatory surgery center, where they will be partnered with a resident and an attending.

GOALS & OBJECTIVES

BY THE END OF THE ROTATION, THE STUDENT WILL:

- Gain expertise in conducting H&Ps
- Hone note writing skills
- Learn routine post-operative management
- Begin to develop basic orthopaedic surgical skills such as arthroscopy, fracture care and management, wound care, and suture techniques
- Begin to develop the ability to critically evaluate diagnostic studies and apply the information to the management of the patient's health problem
- Gain better understanding of the anatomy, pathophysiology, and indications of orthopaedic surgical procedures
