Hospice Care

What is Palliative Care and Hospice Care?	This care helps people live as well as possible while facing serious or life-limiting health problems. This includes managing symptoms and supporting patients with the choices they need to make.	This care helps people who are near the end of life and have an illness that cannot be cured. Hospice care focuses on keeping people comfortable at home or home-like setting by managing symptoms and pain.
Who can receive this type of care?	People with serious conditions such as but not limited to: cancer, dementia, heart disease, advanced lung disease, liver disease, or kidney disease. Palliative care can start at any time during an illness, even at diagnosis or while getting other treatments. It can also help when the illness is at a later stage.	People with these conditions might benefit from hospice care: cancer, dementia, heart disease, advanced lung disease, liver disease, or kidney disease. Hospice care can start when treatments to cure the illness are no longer being used. You can choose to leave hospice care at any time.
What services are provided?	This care focuses on relieving pain, controlling symptoms, providing emotional support, and helping individuals choose treatments that are right for them. Palliative care can change over time to meet a person's needs. As those needs grow, the number of visits and types of support can also increase.	This care focuses on helping people stay at home and feel as comfortable as possible by treating symptoms of the disease rather than the disease itself. Hospice care supports more than just the person who is receiving the service. The care team also helps the whole family, both during the illness and after.
Who provides this care?	The palliative care team can include specialists, nurses, social workers, and other supports. These team members work with the doctors you already know and trust.	Hospice care is provided by a specialized team that is led by a doctor and includes nurses, social workers, chaplains, volunteers, hospice aides, and therapists. These team members work with the doctors you already know and trust.
Where does care happen?	Depending on where you are, palliative care can be given at home, in hospitals, outpatient clinics, or long-term care facilities. Visits can happen in person or through video or phone calls.	Depending on where you are, hospice care can be given at home, in hospitals, or long-term care facilities. Visits are in person.
Does insurance cover services?	Both palliative care and hospice care are often covered by Medicare, Medicaid, and most insurance plans.
