No one really knows what caused my kidneys to fail, but at 21 years old, I needed a transplant. I had my first one in 2010 and although I did well, my function wasn't great.

I was sick all the time, barely eating and had no energy. After an extended emergency hospital stay I had to start dialysis. Thankfully, I was only on dialysis two months before my transplant.

We knew from the first time around that no one in my family was a match, but my little brother still really wanted to donate for me, so we entered the paired exchange program. A match came quickly and his kidney was flown to Florida and one from Florida was flown back for me! It's an incredible process!

The biggest hurdle of my journey, aside from dialysis and complications with my fistula, was the mental hurdle, because it can feel overwhelming. My biggest victory, however, was waking up to a normal functioning kidney. I've never had that. Also leaving the hospital less than 72 hours after surgery was pretty remarkable, too! I'm eternally grateful to the UPMC transplant team at UPMC Pinnacle Harrisburg. Dr. Ladie and Dr. Yang are amazing surgeons and truly caring people. All of the staff and support people in the office are really on your side and want to help in any way possible. I've been consistently impressed with the level of service and care I received and continue to receive from them.

My family, especially my patient and amazing husband, has been extremely supportive. I never would have been able to get through all of this without their help. Without my brother's selfless donation and willingness to enter into the paired exchange with me, I might still be waiting for a match, and still stuck on dialysis.

My advice to anyone facing what I faced is don't lose hope and definitely choose UPMC. You will never feel like just a number in their care. They gave me my life back! I enjoy delicious foods once again, have the energy to chase and play with my two-year old again, take long walks with my dog, travel and take adventures with my husband without having to worry if I'm going to be able to make it through the day. I feel "normal" and happy.

Over the years, PKD caused my kidneys to get worse and eventually I was on a transplant list. On February 28, 2020, I was given back the energy and freedom that my disease and dialysis had taken from me, thanks to my son-in-law.

I'm a farmer and I'm used to getting up at 3:30 a.m. and going all day long. When they told me I had to start dialysis, I knew it was going to change my life. Three days a week, four hours each day, I had a new routine. A preacher talked to me and he said it isn't the end of your life, it's just a change, so I started to look at it that way. Going through that was the biggest struggle, but the biggest relief was once I got my kidney. I'm so grateful to my son-in-law, Jered. When Jered told me we were a perfect match, we couldn't believe it. We talked to others who had it done and I didn't want him to do it unless he was 100% sure, but he was committed.

At first, I had to lose weight to be eligible and so they gave me a date to meet that goal. The date they gave me pushed me hard to get it down.

Life is good and I'm back to working on the farm. That is when I am happy. Being around for my family -- especially my grandkids -- was what I was striving for ... to see them grow up.

Donating a kidney to my father-in-law felt right. It seemed like it was supposed to happen, because every test kept moving us forward. I began testing in February 2019 and the transplant was in February 2020 – only one year after it all started for me.

The care I received at UPMC was great. What was really cool was that the transplant team made a scrapbook of my experience. That was so neat. They truly care about the patient.

My family and church family were very supportive. My boss even gave me time off. The hardest part after surgery was not being able to

be outside right away and work like I'm used to working. I'm not very good at siting still and that may have been the biggest challenge.

At the end of the day, I didn't really have any nerves about donating. I felt it was something I could do to keep my father-in-law around longer. I wanted him to be here for his grandkids.

I would encourage others to consider donating a kidney if they can. I trusted in my faith and the process at UPMC. They took out my kidney and I was back to normal in no time.

I was born with PKD and it runs in our family. Along with my mom, two out of four daughters in the family were diagnosed. I had high blood pressure from age 19 and was sent to a kidney specialist. As a result of PKD, I also suffered two mini-strokes. The first one happened a long time ago and the second one left me unable to function about two years ago.

I was on dialysis for more than a year when we began trying to find the match. I would find myself in and out of the hospital. By the time of my transplant, my native kidneys were so huge there wasn't even enough room to remove just one so they took them both out and placed the new, healthy kidney inside. The care at UPMC was in word ... wonderful. I couldn't believe them when I got "the call." When you are on the chain it goes so much faster than what I expected. There are ups and downs, though. Even though people would say, "It will happen for you, Linda," I always thought yea right. So when I found out, I was so elated.

Today, I have so much energy. I used to be in bed all the time. After I got the transplant and was healed, it felt like I was a completely different person. Looking back, I can honestly say that while life can be hard, it also can be rewarding.







I am familiar with polycystic kidney disease. Not only was I born with it, but my grandmother, mother, and two sisters passed away from the disease. My youngest sister, received a transplant five years ago and is doing well. Despite all the personal loss, my life felt pretty normal until 2017 when my kidney function fell and I began home peritoneal dialysis treatments. Still, I was able to continue many activities, including racquetball.

In the summer of 2018, we took a family vacation – and my dialysis machine and supplies – to Key West. I was able to go kayaking, bike riding, swimming, and jet skiing. In the summer of 2019, we went to South Dakota. Again, I took my dialysis machine and supplies and was able to go horse-back riding, rock climbing, and zip-lining. However, in the fall of 2019, I needed to increase the number of treatments and started to lose energy and quality of sleep.

For me, the biggest hurdle was the realization that my kidney function had reached "end-stage." Despite the fact I had been preparing for this practically all my life, it still hit me like a ton of bricks. The big victory was the day I got a call to come to the hospital for a kidney transplant. It also was a sad day, because I received my kidney from a young, deceased donor.

I was very pleased by the friendly and knowledgeable staff at UPMC. I knew of Dr. Yang's reputation, and I was surprised when I met him in the hospital a couple of weeks after the transplant and he recognized me immediately! He is very caring and very good at his job. The entire team was friendly and caring. I was actually amazed to see how "routine" kidney transplants have become. I felt completely safe and in good hands.

Today, I'm back to playing sports and I get involved with my kids' activities. I also enjoy building things and taking walks with my wife. She, along with my sister and neighbor who also had a transplant, were my biggest cheerleaders. For those waiting to get "the call," my advice is to be patient and take care of yourself as best you can. It is a modern miracle and is well worth the wait. Since the surgery, I have two additional children, but otherwise nothing has changed. I've been asked all kinds of questions about my health and function and truthfully, I am fine and everything works just like it did before the transplant. The biggest hurdle was assuring my family that I would be okay.

Although Linda and I began only as acquaintances through church, of course that has changed now. There's a verse in the book of Proverbs that says, "Trust in the Lord with all of your heart and lean not to your own understanding." This helps me whenever I feel uncertain about God's plan for my life. I'm reminded that my understanding of circumstances is finite while His understanding is eternal.

I received a transplant in 2003 because my kidneys had failed. I was a healthy athlete and there wasn't really a reason. At that time, I got one from my father and it lasted 17 years, but it slowly declined. During the testing process it looked like we might be a perfect match – until we were told we were not because of our incompatible antibodies. As a nurse, Jamie knew about the paired donor exchange program and decided to explore that. Despite my initial concerns, my wife said – we're going to do this. When we got the call informing us it was all lined up, it was surreal. The transplant team told Jamie her kidney was going to a young lady who was only 18 and had been waiting 10 years. My wife may not have been my kidney donor, but because of her, she saved my life. I'm 50 and feel 25. I don't know how I'd be faring without Jamie and of course, my donor. Every day is a gift.

It was a life changing experience full of gratitude. What is most rewarding is knowing many individuals have a second chance of living life to its fullest. There was never any doubt in my mind that this choice wasn't worth taking. My perspective about life is different now than before surgery. While I have always valued life, after this experience, I have become a walking motto! People tell me all of the time, "I couldn't be you," or "I wouldn't be able to do it." My response to them is "Yes you would!"

In donating my kidney, I feel I have created an everlasting bond and empowered myself to be a better person, while encouraging others to become donors. For anyone considering becoming an organ donor, my advice is don't consider it, just do it! Knowing you can save a life and help others is what life is about.

Although I began to suffer from high blood pressure at age 28, my kidney issues started in 2007. What I thought was a common cough and cold landed me in the ICU for three days. At that time, a doctor told me that my kidney was failing and I would need a new one within two years. I was in shock. I was also informed that my high blood pressure played a huge part in my kidney failure. I decided I was going to make changes in my lifestyle. I stopped smoking, ate lower sodium foods, and made my health a priority. These habits, along with the excellent treatment by my doctor, extended the life of my kidney for seven additional years.

In 2014, my kidney finally failed completely and I started dialysis. I made the best out of my situation and became great friends with many of the patients. They dubbed me "The Candy Man," because every Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday I would come into the center for treatment with a big bag of candy to share with the patients and staff. In February 2020, my life changed. I received my new kidney. Dr. Ladie did a great job and I really enjoyed getting to know her -- especially when she told me stories about her time at medical school in Grenada, where my family is from.

I would like to thank God and the family of my donor for giving me a second chance. I won't take it for granted. Maybe one day, I will be able to personally thank them. I am forever grateful for each person that played a role throughout this 13-year journey: My family, friends, the staff at the dialysis center, each and every one of my doctors, nurses, and the surgical staff. Their kindness and compassion will never be forgotten.

Today, I feel more energetic overall. I have a huge appetite, which is great because I'm in the kitchen cooking again. I'm also able to work in my garden, walk with my daughter without getting short of breath, and make home improvements around the house. I used to work in construction before I became sick, so it's like I got the old me back... only better!


