# DID YOU KNOW?

Are you on dialysis and/or a kidney transplant recipient?
You may be eligible for **Pennsylvania's Chronic**Renal Disease Program (CRDP), a state-funded program for people with end-stage renal disease.

If you meet the criteria below, CRDP can be used as a last resort to help with the cost of renal-related care. Coverage is typically good for up to one year after approval and must be renewed annually. We encourage you to explore this valuable resource as a way to help cover the cost of immunosuppression medicines.


#### **Eligibility Criteria**

To qualify for CRDP funding, you must:

- Be a U.S. citizen or legal alien;
- Be a Pennsylvania resident;
- Have end-stage renal disease: and
- Have a household income at or below 300% of the federal poverty income guidelines (varies year to year).

COVID-19 was declared a pandemic in March 2020 and has resulted in more than a million deaths in the United States and many more illnesses. Many more have experienced serious illness and complications. COVID-19 vaccines became available in late 2020 and they remain our best way to prevent severe illness and hospitalizations.

Transplant recipients require immunosuppression medications after transplant. These medicines are meant to prevent antibodies (proteins that immune cells make to typically help fight infection) and reactive immune cells from forming against the transplant. If and when antibodies or immune cells do form against the kidney and cause damage, that is known as rejection. The typical treatment for rejection is to give additional immunosuppression.

Immunosuppression medications help to prevent rejection. But they also make it more difficult to form antibodies and immune responses to infections and vaccines (decreased vaccine response). This is why immunosuppression medications increase the risk of viral and bacterial infections. While this is true, transplant and other medical societies strongly recommend that transplant patients receive COVID-19 vaccines to reduce the risk of severe illness from COVID.

A new monoclonal antibody medicine was approved in December 2021 as a prophylaxis against COVID-19. It is called EVUSHELD (tixagevimab co-packaged with cilgavimab). Monoclonal means that it has many copies of the same antibody typically made through lab techniques. Prophylaxis means that it helps to prevent, rather than treat, a disease. EVUSHELD is an antibody that protects against COVID-19. It's just like the antibodies your immune system would make following vaccination.

EVUSHELD was approved based on trials that showed it helped to prevent symptomatic COVID infection. An ongoing trial is being conducted that randomizes nearly 3,500 participants to receive EVUSHELD, and 1,737 participants to receive the placebo. Six-month outcomes data show a greater than 80% reduction in COVID infections in those who received EVUSHELD. The antibody also was very well tolerated with adverse event rates similar to those in the placebo group, most commonly injection site reaction.

At UPMC Harrisburg, we started giving EVUSHELD to immunosuppressed patients in spring 2022. It does take some planning to receive. For scheduling purposes, we ask patients to let us know in advance if they want to receive EVUSHELD. In June 2022, Emergency Use Authorization was modified to allow for a repeat dose of EVUSHELD six months after the initial dose. We plan to offer this second dose as scheduling allows.

As we head into fall, vaccination against COVID-19 is still strongly recommended for transplant patients. We also advise getting EVUSHELD. Recommendations regarding COVID-19 continue to evolve. There are also newer treatments available for COVID-19 infection. Patients should contact our office **before receiving these treatments**. There is a risk some may interact with your other transplant medicines.

### FINANCIAL HELP FOR LIVING KIDNEY DONORS

There are two organizations that offer **valuable financial assistance to qualifying living kidney donors**. Our staff is here to help you connect with them!

#### National Living Donor Assistance Center (NLDAC)

NLDAC's government grants offer up to \$6,000 for certain expenses during the living-donor kidney transplant process.

They include:

- Travel-related expenses Transportation, mileage, food, and hotel stays.
- Lost wages Money a living donor would have earned from employment if they had not missed work during the donation process.
- **Dependent care** Money a living donor would need for expenses to care for children, a disabled adult, or an elderly person because of their donation.

Applications must be completed by living kidney donors and their organ recipients to determine eligibility. Our office can help send your application to NLDAC for review.

#### **Donor Shield**

Donor Shield is a program of the National Kidney Registry. It protects employed living donors who take part in a kidney paired exchange.

This protection includes:

- Lost wage reimbursement for donation-related time off work (up to \$2,000 per week for up to six weeks)
- Reimbursement of eligible donation-related travel and lodging costs (up to \$3,000)
- Protection for donation-related complications up to one year after surgery (additional travel and lodging reimbursement up to \$3,000 and lost wage reimbursement of up to \$1,500 per week)
- Free legal support for issues directly related to kidney donation

To connect with the Donor Shield Program, talk first with a UPMC Harrisburg Living Donor coordinator.
