Your Pregnancy Calendar

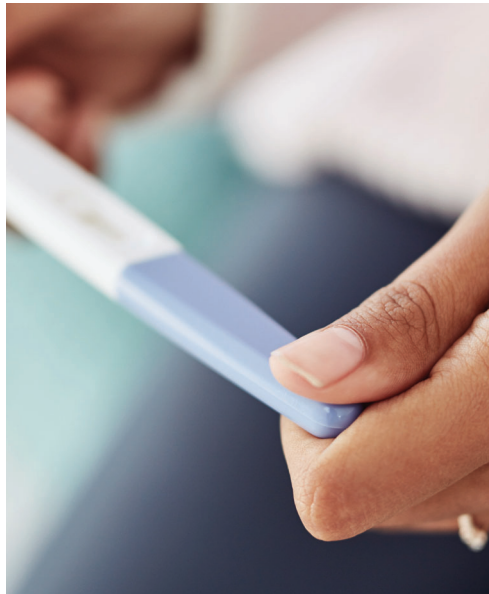

4th Trimester



2-3 Days After You Go Home From the Hospital — Baby's Provider Visit



2-6 Weeks After Delivery - Mom's Visit In Office

To-Do List

- Check with your insurance provider to see if you are eligible to receive a breast pump
- Get rest when you can
- Keep track of how you are feeling and let your provider know if you are experiencing feelings of depression or anxiety
- Wear the purple "I Delivered" bracelet that you received in this hospital. In case of a medical emergency, this bracelet lets care providers know that you recently had a baby
- Schedule follow-up visits for you and your baby

You may be able to leave the hospital anywhere between 24-72 hours after delivery. Talk with your care team to see when you will be ready to go home.



When you leave the hospital, you may receive a follow-up phone call from a UPMC childbirth expert. Please let us know how you are doing. **We are here to answer any questions you may have.**

Day of Delivery

The day of delivery is different for everyone. You may come in for labor, have an induction of labor, or a planned C-section. Your provider will give you special instructions to help you prepare for the day of delivery.

What to Expect in the Hospital After Your Delivery

- You will watch educational videos (prevention of Shaken Baby Syndrome and Sudden Infant Death Syndrome) and will be given printed discharge instructions specific to your care needs.
- You will learn more about breastfeeding and receive expert assistance as needed.
- You will receive routine blood testing.

- We welcome 1 support person to stay with you overnight.

What to Expect in the Hospital for Your Baby

- Your baby will receive a Hepatitis B vaccine and routine medicines and testing to keep them healthy.
- Your baby will be seen by a doctor.
- If you have a baby boy, he may be circumcised (only if you choose circumcision).
- To support successful feeding, UPMC does not provide pacifiers in our postpartum (after delivery) units. If you would like your baby to use a pacifier, you may bring one from home.

- Develop your birth plan
- Have a screening for diabetes during pregnancy (gestational diabetes)
- Have an ultrasound
- Get the Flu/TDap vaccine
